We started two new clubs this term – Puzzle Club which has proved very successful and Creative Writing Club which is just a joy.

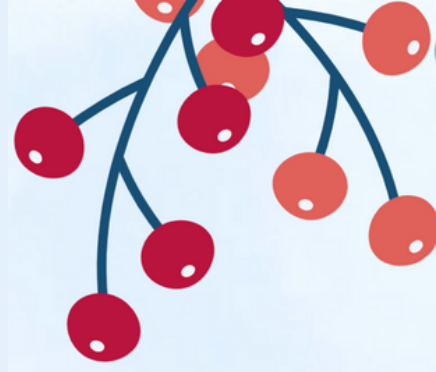

It’s been a fantastic term, and we look forward to even more reading adventures in the new year!





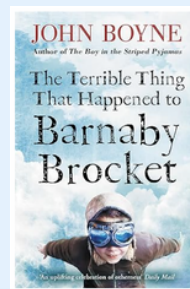
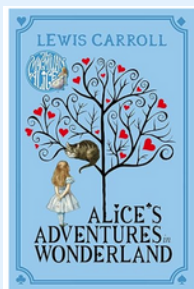
## Tutor Time Reading

KS3 pupils have thoroughly enjoyed engaging with a selection of new ‘reading for pleasure’ texts being shared with them during tutor time each morning.

Such texts include classics from ‘Alice in Wonderland’, ‘Sherlock Holmes’ and ‘Wind in the Willows’, to modern reads such as ‘The Black Book of Secrets’, ‘October October’ and ‘Barnaby Brockett’.

This exciting new initiative started this term with a range of diverse texts on rotation around the year groups. We are aiming to: inspire further reading for pleasure; increase take-up of book loans in the school library; expose pupils to varied perspectives and cultures; challenge pupils to step outside their immediate experiences; develop crucial skills in empathy, perspective-taking and active listening, as well as developing student’s intellectual and emotional growth.

The curated list also supports the school’s wider reading vision by introducing pupils to varying levels of textual complexity, writing styles, vocabulary, comprehension and the ability to navigate technical texts across all subjects.



## Guided Reading

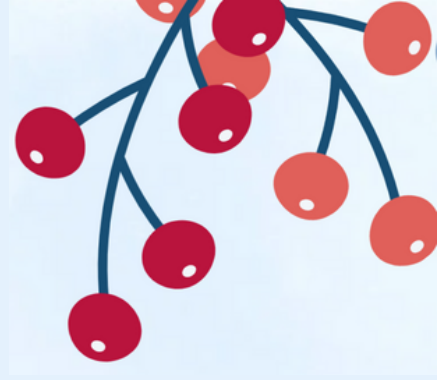
Another reading initiative introduced whole-school this term has been our ‘Non-Fiction Fridays’ – whereby pupils read real-world texts (such as articles, reviews, reports, journals, diary entries etc.) related to areas of our school curriculum.

Each week a subject around the school takes it in turn to provide our pupils with texts that not only support their learning across the curriculum, but also help to develop their cultural capital.

We are keen to contextualise our academic subjects for our pupils, helping them to see the value of scholarship beyond compulsory education. Our Guided Reading programme not only enhances their literacy skills and exposes them to non-fiction reading, but more crucially it demonstrates the real-world importance of how different subjects intersect with contemporary issues, current affairs and career pathways.

Ultimately, we hope to equip students with the confidence and understanding necessary to engage critically with the world, with texts they read and to succeed in higher education and future employment.





## Maths News

### Axiom Maths

Axiom Maths is now successfully up and running for selected pupils in both Year 7 and Year 8. Miss Palmer, who leads the sessions has been really impressed with the pupils effort and knowledge.

Axiom maths lessons involve challenging problems that nurture mathematical talent and inspire pupils to think like university mathematicians. Lessons have featured an introduction to Game Theory. Well done to all the pupils involved.

### Maths Club.

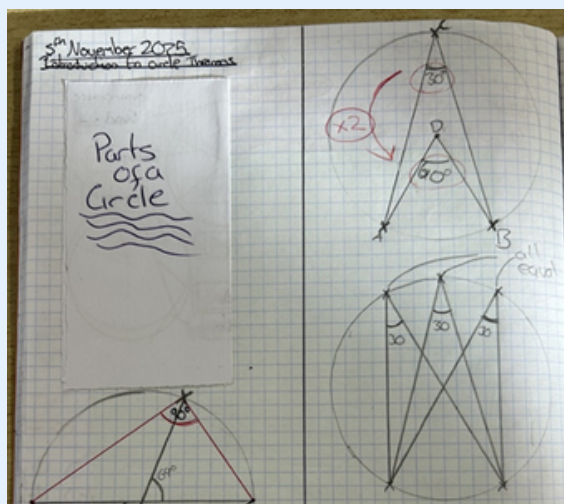

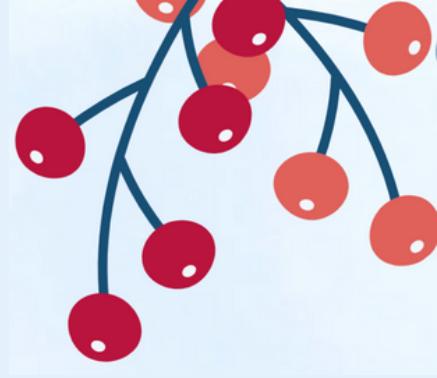
### Further Maths

A big well done to the Year 11 Further Maths students on attending their additional after school sessions and for all their hard work with this qualification. Mrs Roberts has been very impressed with all pupils involved.

### Lesson activities

In Maths, Year 10 higher tier students have been investigating Circle Theorems. Students were given a task that involved 'guided discovery'. Instead of being given the rules involved, students were asked to draw circles with specific lines to independently look at any relationships that naturally occur. This approach proved beneficial, as when pupils started doing teacher led sessions the students had already seen some of the theorems by their own self-discovery. Mr Anslow was particularly impressed with his groups' Circle Theorem topic checks, with many students achieving full marks, clearly demonstrating that they can apply the rules in exam style questions. ## English, Drama and Media News

What an amazing autumn term we have had. Below are some of the highlights!

### **Trips:**

So far this academic year we have taken fifty Year 9 students to Stratford-upon-Avon to watch a RSC First Encounters production of King Lear. As the tragedy unfolded, our students explored themes and ideas linking to family, betrayal, honesty and ambition. The students enjoyed interacting with the actors and were all impressed with the live band that accompanied the show. After the performance, students took part in a “treasure hunt” around Stratford. This allowed them to explore and discover some of the more exciting parts of this town including: Shakespeare’s grave and the inscription on it; Shakespeare’s birthplace and the New House.



### **Year 7:**

Our Year 7s have made a super start! So far, they have studied short stories, An Inspector Calls and A Christmas Carol. Whilst exploring these texts, we have considered narrative hooks; key themes such as responsibility and guilt along with expanding our vocabulary.

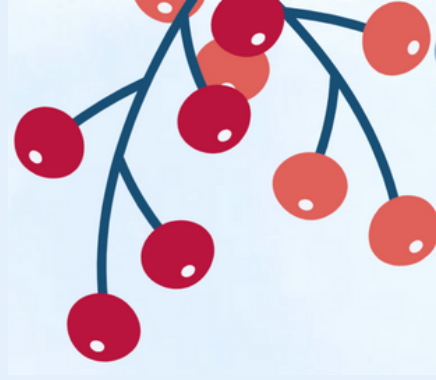
### **Year 8:**

Students have begun the year by becoming sleuths! They have followed in the footsteps of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle as they try to plot and predict who is the villain of the piece in The Hound of the Baskervilles. We have been extremely pleased with how this year group has taken on the challenge of language whilst studying this text.

### **Year 9:**

As we approach GCSEs, this year group is given a taste of what the course next year is like. They began the year by reading Miller’s A View from The Bridge and exploring dual readings, social dynamics and the play form. As the darker months crept in, we have matched the mood by studying The Gothic. From Poe to Susan Hill, we have considered how The Gothic is crafted and what makes it such a popular genre.





## English: Key Stage 4

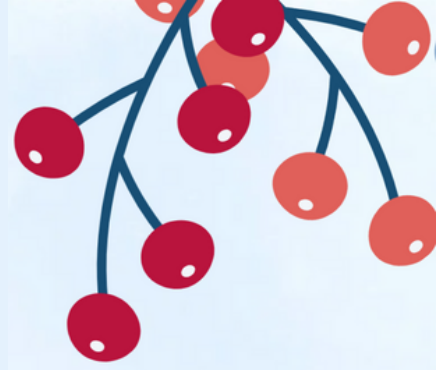
Our year 10s and 11s have been working hard in preparation for their final exams.

We are so proud of how the Year 11s approached their Spoken Language Endorsement. This can be a nerve-wracking moment as they have to speak in front of an audience for ten minutes. Our students have discussed topics from poetry, to cannibalism, to misogyny in football.

Year 11s also showed real grit and determination in sitting their Language Paper 2 and Literature Paper 2 mock exams. These are the longest of all of their English exams and we can see how well they prepared for this in their responses.

Years 10s have had a busy start to the year! We began by looking at unseen poetry before moving on to Animal Farm. The year 10s are now studying their 19<sup>th</sup> Century novel and getting to grips with more archaic and formal language. They have all shown real enthusiasm at the start of their GCSE journey.





## History club

History Club have had a busy first term. At the start of the year, History Club helped prepare for the Year 6 Open Evening and excelled themselves in their confidence and how they represented the College. They ran numerous activities, such as a historical food quiz, a mini-exhibition on the history of the College, and a re-enactment of the Boston Tea Party.

Since then, they have been working on historical research projects. Each group was assigned a random country, and had to prepare to present on an aspect of that country's history. This has led to projects on South Korean culture, Hungarian architecture, Mexican tourist sites, and German sausages.

History Club have also watched the excellent Cold War comedy *Dr Strangelove* over the past few weeks.

## Debate club

Debate Club began the year by helping with the 'Devil's Advocate' order at Year 6 Open Evening, where they had to prove any argument given to them wrong. Across the term Debate Club have continued with their discussions of matters ranging from the grand, political and philosophical to the more mundane and everyday.

Tentative plans are also underway to explore inter-school debating in a more formal style, so watch this space!

## Citizenship Updates

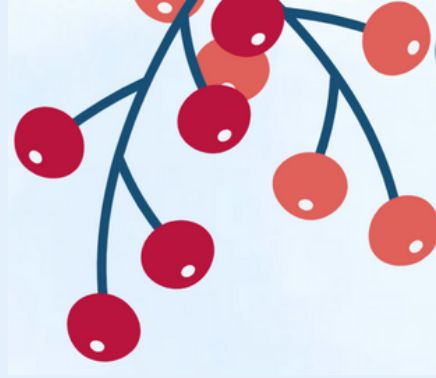
At the start of this year, Year 11 Citizenship pupils completed their Citizenship Action project, where they had to work together to try and fix an issue in their community. This saw projects on topics ranging from neurodiversity awareness, youth engagement in politics, and traffic-calming measures in Castle Donington. All groups worked very well, with many in contact with councillors and even Leicestershire's Police and Crime Commissioner.

There have been two guest speakers for Citizenship pupils this term. In November, county councillor Charles Pugsley, who oversees children's services in Leicestershire County Council, answered questions from Year 11 pupils about his role in local government and the policies of Reform UK.

In December, North West Leicestershire MP Amanda Hack talked with Year 10s and 11s, where she answered questions about support for young people, Labour's response to Reform, and recent policies such as digital ID and changes to jury trials.

Both sessions saw some excellent questions being asked that would have suited Question Time!





## Geography News

This term has been a busy and engaging one in Geography, with pupils across all year groups developing their knowledge of people, places, and environments around the world. Below is a snapshot of what each year group has been learning:

### Year 7

Year 7 pupils have been learning about South East Asia, developing their understanding of the region and its global importance. They have explored important issues such as child labour and investigated the environmental and social impacts of palm oil production, encouraging them to think critically about sustainability and ethical choices.

### Year 8

Year 8 have been studying glaciated landscapes, learning how glaciers shape the land and create distinctive landforms. They have also explored industrial pollution and its impacts, alongside learning about migration and the reasons why people move, both within and between countries.

### Year 9

Year 9 pupils have been developing a deeper understanding of climate change. They have examined the causes of climate change, including human and natural factors, and considered the wide-ranging impacts on people and environments across the world.

### Year 10

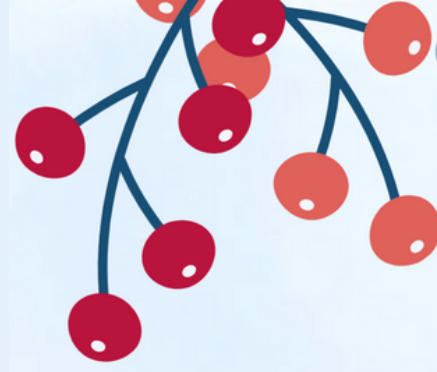
Year 10 have been learning about urban challenges through a case study of the slums of Mumbai, gaining insight into issues such as housing, employment, and access to services. Alongside this, they have been studying natural landscapes, focusing on how physical processes shape our world.

### Year 11

Year 11 pupils have been working extremely hard for their mock examinations, demonstrating commitment and resilience. In lessons, they have also been learning about global ecosystems, focusing on tropical rainforests and the taiga biome, and exploring their characteristics, value, and the threats they face. We also had a great couple of days out in Derbyshire looking at river characteristics near the Longshaw Estate.

We have also hosted lots of inter school football matches on our new astro. Our Y11 boys were victorious against the Y10 team.

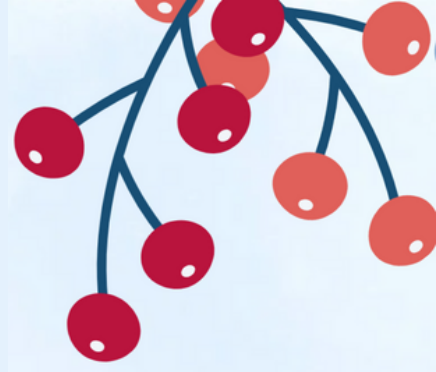
The Y8 and Y7 team played out a 2-2 draw and our Y7 girls football team beat our Y8 girls in a very competitive game.

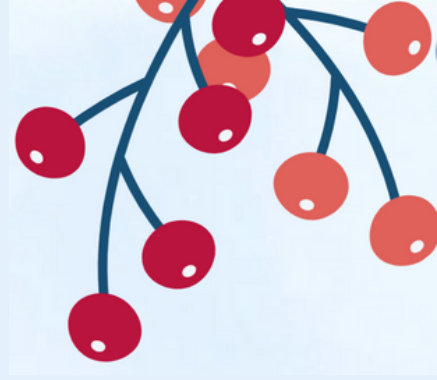
Bailey Dobb (Y11) and Luca Zujovic (Y10) continue to make good progress at Stoke City and Derby County F.C.

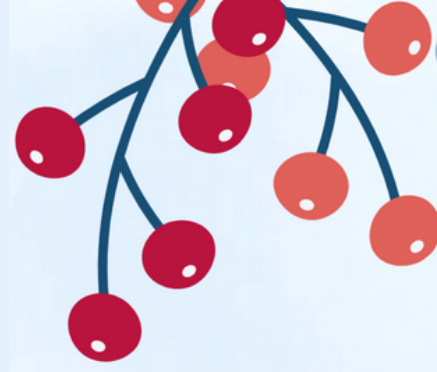
### **Key Stage 4:**

Year 10 French revision will continue the Wednesday after Christmas (Week 2). These are held every other week in L2.





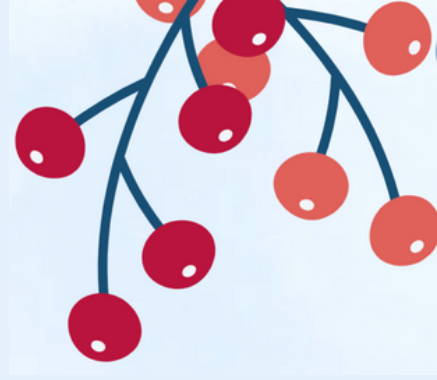
## Year 11s in MFL

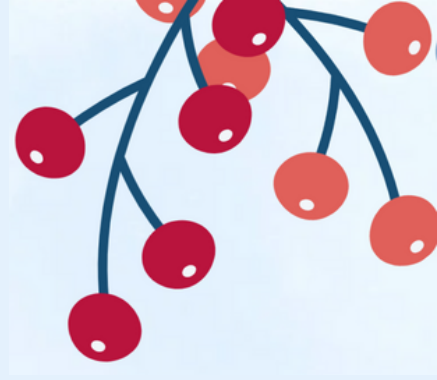
In lessons, our Year 7 pupils have been learning all about the basics of music and composed their own spooky pieces of music based around Camille Saint-Saen's Danse Macabre.

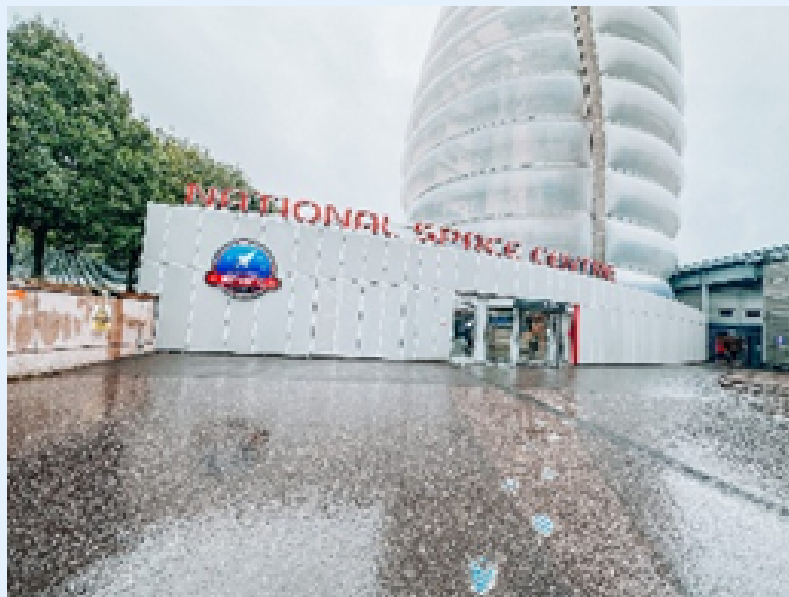
## Year 7 Space Centre Trip

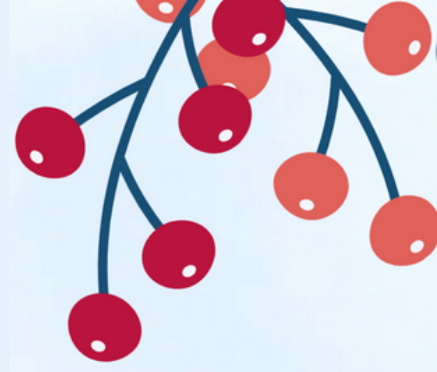
Year 7 students recently enjoyed an exciting and inspiring trip to the National Space Centre.

During the visit, students explored interactive galleries, learned about planets, astronauts and space missions, and experienced the impressive Rocket Tower.

They also took part in an interactive planetarium show, which brought their science learning to life and sparked curiosity about space and future careers in STEM.

Throughout the trip, students were a credit to the school, demonstrating excellent behaviour and consistently following the school ethos.





## Warhammer Club

We are thrilled to have launched an after-school Warhammer Club this term.

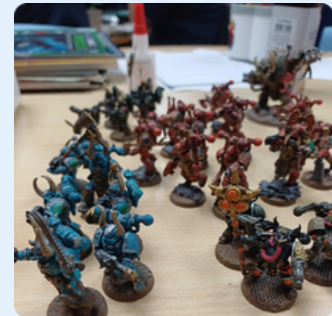
We started with basic building skills from both the basic push fit models and normal kits. Some students have even begun kitbashing (customizing) their own designs. This is done using clippers to take the models off the plastic sprue (or fingers for the push fit models), the plastic glue then melts the two segments together.

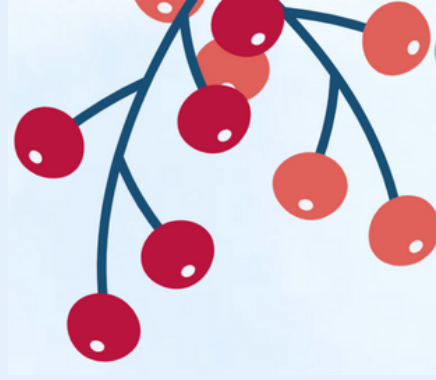
First steps for painting is either spraying (safely done by staff) on a base layer or applying one manually. Layers are built up so that all areas of the model have smooth even initial paint layer.

Advanced painting skills are then applied such as layer paints, dry brushing and washes.

Games are played over 5 rounds with each player taking a turn in each.

- Armies fight over at least 5 objective markers.
- Rules are found in Codexs.
- The game is played using the models the students built and painted, a tape measure and huge amounts of dice.

## Year 8 news

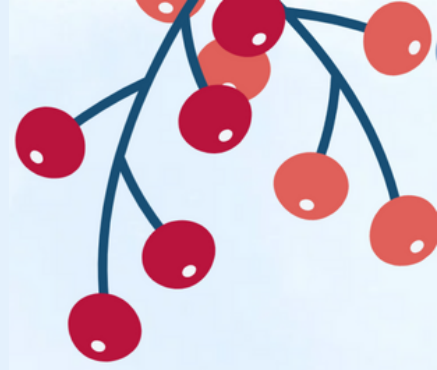
Well done to year 8 pupils for an amazing, but long Autumn term.
